



## All Saints' weekly email: Sunday next before Lent

Dear Friends,

As we approach the Lenten Fast (and with it the grim anniversary of the bishops locking clergy out of their churches last year), this Sunday we contemplate the Lord's Transfiguration.

Fr Peter Anthony gave us much to think about in the January Parish Paper in his reflections on the Transfiguration and the mosaic in Sant'Apollinare in Classe, Ravenna about which we shall hear more in the study day he is planning for later this year. I take the liberty of quoting him, slightly out of context, because his point illuminates Sunday's theme:

*... the Transfiguration points us forward to the life of heaven that we believe is the focus and ultimate end point of our faith. What Peter, James and John witness on the mountain top tells us something of what we hope for in eternity. And a big part of that is the series of experiences and ideas and metaphors which we describe using the idea of seeing God. ... whenever and however we end up seeing God ... it is never just a matter of a distant witnessing of him. Seeing God prompts us to embrace him, to know him, to touch him, to be overwhelmed by him. Seeing God does not just involve the use of our eyes, but our mind, our soul, our whole being. We can see God because God made us able to know and see him. And yet at the same time, that vision wonderfully overwhelms us, inebriates us, and is more than we could ever hope for. The Transfiguration reveals the vision of God is strangely both possible and impossible at the same time; forbidden, and dangerous - and yet intimate and wonderful; awesome, and terrible; yet loving and personal. It points to a wonderful paradox at the heart of our experience of God. He is more than we could ever imagine, or desire, or see, and yet loves us and saves us as our friend and brother.*

Our observance of Lent this year will be curtailed in ways that have become all too familiar. Stations of the Cross will be available online as last year (I hope soon to record a second set for variety), and I have some suggestions for Lenten devotion as follows:

If you like something to contemplate every day, Sister Wendy Becket's *The Art of Lent* (SPCK 2017) is a wonderful resource which I've only just discovered: there's a well-reproduced painting and a reflection for each day, arranged in themed weeks in a small and inexpensive volume.

*Reflections for Lent 2021* (Church House Publishing 2020) is a good resource, focusing on a daily reading from the Daily Office. The bishops of our diocese have also once again produced a book of daily reflections: *Rooted in Love: Lent Reflections on Life in Christ* (SPCK 2020).

From Bishop Rowan Williams (who we hope will be with us for Holy Week, pandemic permitting) comes *Candles in the Dark: Faith, Hope and Love in a Time of Pandemic* (SPCK 2020), 26 accessible meditations originally published online for his local parish.

I would also like to point you again to John Behr's *Becoming Human* (SVS 2013): Fr John was to have led a study day for us last Advent which has been deferred to Saturday **27 November** this year. An overarching theme of his book is how true humanity is revealed in the Passion, death



and Resurrection of the Lord, so it provides an excellent meditative reflection for the coming season.

Sheila Upjohn, who has written widely on Julian of Norwich, offers *The Way of Julian of Norwich: A Prayer Journey Through Lent* (SPCK 2020).

If you're looking for a devotional booklet I'd suggest *Our Lady of Silence: The Devotion of Pope Francis*, by Capuchin Fr Emiliano Antenucci (CTS 2020): devotions, including a set of mysteries for the Rosary, based on an icon and course (*Silence, Silence Speaks*).

Lastly, I'd suggest several of Melvyn Bragg's *In Our Time* podcasts which can be found on the *In Our Time* website or wherever you get your podcasts (I've found podcasts very useful in the Year of Lockdown). There's a subset of them devoted to religion and among these are excellent and informative discussions of the Oxford Movement, Jesuits, the Nicene Creed, St Paul, Gnosticism, the Book of Common Prayer, the Trinity, the Talmud, Mary Magdalene, Purgatory, Augustine's Confessions to name just a few of those I've found enlightening. There's a huge amount there in the Culture and History sections as well.

Keep well and have a happy and holy Lent.
